Foreword

Introduction

This Amendment defines the changes required to ISO/IEC 13868 Name Identification Supplementary Service for support of additional character sets used in various European regions. These include: Cyrillic characters, Turkish characters, Scandinavian characters, Greek characters, and Latin characters used by some eastern European countries.

The contents are expressed as amendments to be made to the base standard. Only those clauses for which amendments are specified are to be changed.

Clause 3

Insert the following new references for the new character sets below the ISO 8859-1 reference:

“ISO 8859-2: 1999, *Information technology - 8-bit single-byte coded graphic character sets - Part 2: Latin alphabet No. 2.*

ISO 8859-3: 1999, *Information technology - 8-bit single-byte coded graphic character sets - Part 3: Latin alphabet No. 3.*

ISO 8859-4: 1998, *Information technology - 8-bit single-byte coded graphic character sets - Part 4: Latin alphabet No.4.*

ISO 8859-5: 1999, *Information technology - 8-bit single-byte coded graphic character sets - Part 5: Latin/Cyrillic alphabet.*

ISO 8859-7: 1987, *Information processing - 8-bit single-byte coded graphic character sets - Part 7: Latin/Greek alphabet.*”

Remove the last reference (CCITT Rec T.61).

Subclause 6.1 “Operations”, Table 1

delete **CharacterSet**, and line 1-9, add the following for new character sets.
